Quick History Lesson of Test-Optional

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- Began at Bowdoin College (ME) in 1970
- Adopted by many smaller, liberal arts based schools in the 80's.
- Gained major traction in the Mid-2000's, with more competitive and STEM based universities adopting policies
- Test-Blind policies also began to make their way into the forefront
- In 2020 as the pandemic hit, testing centers closed worldwide. This forced all schools to adopt some versions of test-optional.

Important Facts from Recent Admission Cycles

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- 49 out of the top 50 <u>US News and World National Universities</u> committed to being test-optional for 21-22 cycle
- Over 1,800 four -year colleges committed to test-optional policies for this past cycle.
- Over 1,450 have already made either test-optional or test-free admissions permanent.
- In 2019, 78% of all applicants submitted test scores.

Important Facts from Recent Admission Cycles

• Only 4% of colleges required test scores for this fall, down from 55% in pre-pandemic 2019.

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
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- Less than half of all early applicants (including early decision, restrictive early action, and early action policies) submitted test scores, defeating any myth that the policy was only seeing growth in the regular decision stages.
- 1.2 Million students took the SAT in 2022 compared to 2.2 Million in 2020.

Test-Optional VS Test-Blind

<u>Test-Optional</u> – Students can choose whether to send their standardized test score to a college. Students who choose not to send their scores WILL NOT be at a disadvantage. In fact, they will be just as competitive for admission as those who send their scores.

<u>Test-Blind or "Test Free"</u> – Colleges WILL NOT use any standardized test scores for admission purposes.














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Will Test-Optional Benefit You?

Is your test score <u>AT LEAST</u> in the top 25th percentile for a given school? If not, you will almost certainly want to apply test-optional.

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If your score rests <u>AT OR ABOVE</u> the 50% average for the previous freshman class at a given school, then consider sending your scores.

If a student with a 1460 SAT score applies to a school where the mean SAT score is 1410, they should consider submitting that score.

The same process/logic applies whether your score is a 910, 1110, or 1310.

It is always your GOAL, and your RESPONSIBILITY as an applicant (along with your counselor, or our spoiler alert! help) to make your application more about four years of high school, and less about four hours of testing.

Specific Rules Surrounding Test-Optional

Do your homework regarding test optional admission statistics

For some school – averages can be misleading Boston College: Overall Admit Rate – 17%

- o 25% of admitted applicants submitted test scores
- 10% of admitted applicants were test optional **University of Virginia**:
- Students without test scores made up 42% of pool, but only 26% of applications

Specific Rules Surrounding Test-Optional

For selective colleges, other parts of your application have to be stellar

- o Grades
- Extracurriculars
- Essays
- o Interview (if available, always do)

Specific Rules Surrounding Test-Optional


Have confidence in those who have done it before...

An internal study at Bates College (an early adopter of test optional) looked at two decades of data, comparing GPAs earned by those submitting scores and those who did not.

- Those who submitted test scores had an average 3.16 GPA
- Those who did not submit test scores had an average 3.13 GPA

To Test or Not to Test

- Register for the SAT/ACT. However, the score importance has diminished to gain admission into a selective college or university.
- 2 Focus on your academic rigor & coursework both inside and outside of your high school.
- ³ Participate in & lead meaningful activities.
- 4 Write strong, compelling essays.
- 5 Demonstrate interest in your colleges.
 - Get to know your teachers. Strong recommendation letters are key for many highly selective colleges.
